# Annual Celebration Program: "Connecting Communities for Watershed Health"

The theme of this year's event is "connecting communities for watershed health," because, at it's core, that's what this watershed council is all about. While there are many different communities within the watershed—be they the conventional municipality sense of community, or the cultural, spiritual, occupational, and the many other types of communities—the Long Tom Watershed is the collective community for all of us. It is the place where we may work, play, or call home., and therefore the watershed's health is an interest we all have a stake in. What happens in one area has downstream implications for fish, wildlife, and people.

Eight years ago, LTWC saw a gap in that upstreamdownstream connection which presented an opportunity for the Council and its constituents to become involved in improving the urban part of the watershed for the benefit of the entire watershed community. Ever since, the Council and what is now the Urban Waters & Wildlife Program, has been leading a collaborative effort to improve urban water quality and habitat in the Eugene-Springfield metro area through the voluntary participation of businesses and our community members.

During the Annual Celebration, our presenters will highlight some examples of on-the-ground project success stories and illustrate how the Council's work in the urban area is connecting upstream and downstream neighbors across this watershed community. You'll hear from staff at two local businesses, Jodi Sommers of Essex General Construction and Melissa Koke of QSL Print Communications, who were each very involved in the process of partnering with the LTWC to implement an urban stormwater project at their respective business. Volunteer extraordinaire and landscape architect, Kevin Shanley, will talk about how the local impact of our work in the Urban Waters Program fits into the bigger picture of watershed health and improving water quality and drinking water source areas downstream.

# Annual Meeting Business - board election and bylaws updates

All members of the Long Tom Watershed Council—that is any adult who supports the purpose and mission of the Council and is connected to the watershed community—may sign in at the October 22<sup>nd</sup> Annual Meeting and Celebration and vote to elect our slate of volunteer board members and approve any bylaws updates.

# **Board Elections**

Each year, the Council recruits and recommends a slate of Board of Directors candidates for election at the Annual Meeting & Celebration that balances the diversity of perspectives and geographic and land use representation in the watershed. Below is the 2018 slate of board candidates. More information about their background is included in our website at <u>longtom.org/about-ltwc/board-of-directors/</u>. ### Jabrila Via, Upper Long Tom

Jabrila is a retired farmer and the current property owner, and Farm & Food Educator, at Winter Green Farm. Jabrila was elected to the board for a one-year term in 2017 and is standing for reelection for a term of one more year.



#### Al Hrynynsyn, At Large

Al is a retired geologist and teacher. He and his wife, Donna, live on a small ranch along Owens Creek and have partnered with the Council on a riparian planting project. He also serves on the board of the Upper Willamette Soil & Water Conservation District. Al stepped in to fill a mid-year vacancy on the board and is standing for election for a four-year term.



#### Darian Lightfoot, At Large

Darian is currently working towards her master's degree in public administration and nonprofit management at the University of Oregon's Planning, Public Policy, and Management Program. She is also the Inclusion Coordinator at Northwest Youth Corps. In 2017, Darian was elected to a term of one year, and is standing for re-election for a four-year term.



#### Patricia McDowell, At Large

Dr. McDowell is a professor at the University of Oregon Geography Department, and has been on LTWC's technical team for many years. Pat filled a mid-year vacancy on the board, and she is standing for election for a full four-year term.



#### Lindsay Reaves, Upper Long Tom

Lindsay is a fourth-generation Oregonian who, along with her husband, Tom Bauman, manage Bauman Tree Farm as a sustainable forest tree farm. She also hosts Forests Today and Forever's Forest Field Days each year on her tree farm. Lindsay filled a mid-year vacancy on the board and is standing for a four-year term.

#### A Special Thank you to outgoing board member Steve Horning.

Steve, a fourth-generation farmer and co-owner of Deerhaven Farms, has served on the LTWC board as a representative of the Lower Long Tom geography since 2013. We want to thank Steve for his years of service and dedication to the LTWC Board!



# **Proposed Bylaws Updates**

LTWC is proposing a couple small adjustments to the Council's bylaws, the governing document of our organization. These changes have been reviewed and approved by our Board of Directors to go up for adoption by a vote from the Council membership at the Annual Meeting.

## Amendment 1: Simplification of Board Composition Guidelines

This proposed update would simplify board composition guidelines. With the Council's expanded service area to the Willamette River and the entire Eugene-Springfield metro area, the current bylaws (see below) no longer reflect the best alignment of the Council's geographical reach, nor do they allow board composition to reflect non-geographic dimensions of watershed diversity. The proposed amendment would retain the spirit and intent of recruiting diverse interests to serve on the board, while building the specific recruitment and composition needs into the strategic plan.

#### **Current Language**

2.2 "The Board of Directors shall include a diverse range of geographic areas and community interests in order to engage a balance of interested and affected persons within the watershed and surrounding area."

2.3 "The geographic diversity of the Board membership shall be as follows: one-fourth (1/4) from each of the main sub-basins of the watershed – Upper Long Tom, Lower Long Tom, and Amazon – with the remaining one-fourth (1/4) serving at large. Up to two (2) additional directors may be elected to the "at large" sector to serve the needs of the Long Tom Watershed Council.

#### Proposed New Language (will vote upon at 10/22 Annual Meeting & Celebration)

2.2 "The Board of Directors shall include a diverse range of geographic areas, land use, community and cultural interests in order to engage a balance of interested and affected persons within the watershed and surrounding area."

2.3 "Board recruitment objectives and desired board composition shall be articulated in the strategic plan."

# Amendment 2: Clarification of the Term "Vacancy"

This proposed update would lend clarity to the term "vacancy" such that it's broadened to include any unfilled seat on the Board of Directors.

#### **Current Language**

4.1 "The Board may appoint pro-tem [temporary] directors to fill vacancies occurring prior to the end of full terms."

4.2 "Any director appointed to fill a vacancy will serve only until the next Annual Meeting, at which time s/he must be elected in accordance with the procedure outlined in [the corresponding articles of the bylaws].

#### Proposed New Language (will vote upon at 10/22 Annual Meeting & Celebration)

4.1 "The Board may appoint pro-tem directors to fill vacancies."

The proposed amendment simply ends the clause after the word "vacancy." Article 4.2 will remain in unchanged.


