PUBLIC MEETING: APRIL 20,6-8 P.M. | EUGENE PUBLIC LIBRARY

Tools for Reducing Pesticide Use In and Around Your Homes

As spring ushers in longer days, many folks will be out planting gardens and tidying up their lawns and spaces around their homes. The warmer weather can also bring unwanted pests, and every year, an array of pesticides are used to control weeds and invasive plants, insects, rodents, and other wildlife. These chemicals can have harmful impacts on water quality, native plants and wildlife, and on the drinking water of our downstream neighbors in Monroe.

Our April 20th public meeting will focus on providing tips, tools, and resources to understand the latest pesticide data and trends, and how you can reduce your pesticide use. The event will be at the Bascomb-Tykeson room of the Eugene Public Library (see next page for details, including for parking).

For 13 years, LTWC and partners have been monitoring pesticide presence in Amazon Creek as one of Oregon's Pesticide Stewardship Partnerships (PSPs). **David Gruen, Columbia River Coordinator at the Oregon DEQ,** will share an overview and history of the PSP Program, and why it's a priority for the State of Oregon. He'll also help contextualize why we should be concerned about pesticides in our water and their impacts on water quality and aquatic communities, and how the impacts of pesticides are measured through aquatic benchmarks. **Amanda Reinholtz, LTWC's River Scientist & GIS Specialist**, will then share the latest results from pesticide monitoring data in Amazon Creek, the context of those results, and some actions people can take to reduce particular chemical detections of concern. Our final speaker, Chris Hedstrom, will present a new online resource from Oregon State University called "Solve Pest Problems". **Chris is the Communications & Outreach Coordinator for OSU's Integrated Pest Management Center** will walk attendees through how to use the site and discuss the content in the context of what we can be doing to reduce pesticide inputs into our waterways.

LTWC is excited to announce our new Executive Director and Watershed Coordinator, Steve Dear! Steve joined our team of staff on March 23rd and is already getting to work connecting with and learning about the incredible people and partners of the Council. He has dedicated his career to working collaboratively to advance the missions of national, statewide, and local nonprofit organizations focused on community organizing around environmental and social justice issues.

He's led teams that provided organizing and technical assistance among historically and racially segregated and underserved Southern rural communities and local and state governments, resulting in \$58 million in desperately needed water, wastewater, and solid waste infrastructure projects. He wrote a book on alternative wastewater technologies for leaders of small communities, and he has worked as a newspaper reporter.

For the past eight years, Steve and his spouse have lived in the woods of the

foothills of the Coast Range near the banks of the upper Long Tom. He has been deeply involved in Eugene and Lane County community affairs and has served on a variety of water and environment-related commissions and boards. In his free time he enjoys playing guitar and drums in bands and helping their dog Joe explore Oregon's coast and mountains.



LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

The Long Tom Watershed lies within the traditional homelands of the Tribes and Bands of the Kalapuyan peoples. Following treaties in the 1850s, the Kalapuya people were dispossessed of and forcibly removed from their Indigenous homeland by the United States government. Today, many descendants are citizens of the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde Community and

the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians. We acknowledge that we are on occupied lands, and express our respect for Kalapuya and all Tribal Nations of Oregon, and the important contributions they continue to make to their communities, including to the stewardship of this watershed.
